




# **History of Medicine Inn**

John (Eric) Engman and his wife to be Johanna emigrated from Sweden to Ishpeming, MI where they met and were married. John Engman was injured in an explosion at a copper mine where he worked and moved with their family to Minneapolis around 1885. They lived at 527 Irving Ave. N. and John worked for the City of Minneapolis and was also a stone mason. Johanna (who took her training at the Univ. of Minneapolis) was a Licensed Midwife for the City of Minneapolis.

In 1898 they bought the store and property at the corner of what would now be Nathan Lane and E. Medicine Lake Blvd. Along with their three sons Eric Albert (24), David (18) and Walfred N. (15) they moved to Plymouth.



They went into the resort business with picnic grounds, picnic tables and 35 rental boats plus farming 40 plus acres of land. They also harvested ice from Medicine Lake in the winter and sold it to Cedar Lake Ice Co. among others.

Johanna Engman died in 1913 and the remaining family members ran the business. Later around 1935 after prohibition had ended, part of the building was remodeled and became Medicine Inn. The family ran the business until 1950 when it was leased out to others

The building and grounds were sold in 1967 and the building razed to make way for the At-The-Lake Apartments.

In the late 1800's there was a settlement between what is now the 2200 and 2700 blocks of E. Medicine Lake Blvd. It consisted of a Post Office in the former Holmes house (2200 block and is still standing), a store which also had school rooms on the second floor (this was Medicine Inn mentioned above), a blacksmiths shop in a garage type building at 2420 E. Medicine Lake Blvd. (which burned down in 1955) and Hahn's Hotel owned by Henry and Helen Hahn which stood in the 2600 area where Medicine Ridge and Medicine Lake Blvd meet. It was razed in the 1930's by the owner Lonnie Flosseth to make way for several cottages that he built. He also moved a house with a large glazed in porch from the peninsula across the lake ice in winter and not a window was cracked. There were several other houses in the area in the late 1800's some of which are still being occupied today.

#### **Bill Graham Photos**

John Gaveske a Plymouth resident has shared a few photos from Great Uncle Bill Graham who passed away in 1955 and John inherited his Great Uncle's camera and negatives. Bill Graham was a construction worker who liked to bring his camera everywhere he went. He worked on the Foshay Tower and the Armory building among others.

A number of his pictures follow below. One picture shows him sitting on the girders on top of the Foshay. On the Armory picture you can see 4 workers up on the framework and names of the contractors etc on signs seen in the photo. On the 2<sup>nd</sup> Armory photo you can read "Edwards Motor Co." on a building to the left and "Minnesota Flour" can be read on a sign in the right background.


# **Donations**
