History on Parade

On Sunday October 24th the Plymouth Historical Society conducted the 3rd Annual History on Parade tour. A Classic TCRT 1954 bus was chartered from the Minnesota Transportation Museum and 50 people toured Plymouth for two ½ hours. The tour was narrated and a booklet describing the locations of many past and present buildings was provided to each participant.

The tour made stops at the Louis Trittlewitz farm house. A farm house that is over 100 years old and was built in either 1904 or 1910. It has been beautifully restored and maintained by Becky & Chris Pierson. Historic pictures provided of the farm house and barns in the 1920's allowed one to imagine what it was like so long ago. You could almost hear the cows mooing and the rooster crowing.

Another stop was made at Medicine Lake City Hall. The stop was hosted by Ted Hoshal who provided refreshments. We reviewed all the local historical pictures and artifacts that he has assembled of the Medicine Lake area. We even tested out the new bridge over Bassett's Creek that was just completed by the City of Plymouth. In the past the load limit prevented anything like a bus from crossing for fear of collapse. Our last stop was Mt. Olivet Chapel, with Ben Broman providing the history of the church and restoration details. Our bus driver kept entertained and a great time was had by all.

2nd Grade Class Tours

Again this September and October the Plymouth Historical hosted thirteen second grade classes from Birchview, Sunset and Oakwood Elementary Schools. They had a checklist with a variety of items that they had to locate in the museum and determine what it was or what it was used for. They were very well organized

in groups and toured the museum, carriage house and Bob Gasch took them for a story telling walk in the "Big Woods" with the maple trees in full color. Kay Bertrand, Betty Jacobson (shown below), Dennis Jacobson, Vern Dotseth, Ben Broman and Gary Schiebe hosted the young visitors.
