





Zuhrah Shrine Horsemen

Finding old pictures and uncovering interesting stories about Plymouth's past, makes history come alive. Who knew that the Zuhrah Shrine Horsemen got their start in Plymouth back in 1947? These pictures and information were provided by Dick Rindal who is historian for the Zuhrah Shrine Horsemen and Ron Snook life long Plymouth resident who lives across Cty Road 6 from the Zuhrah Horsemen's stable.



Plymouth Stables from 1948 to 1955


In 1947 the Zuhrah Shrine Horsemen were established at a meeting held at J. C. Eide Farm in Plymouth, by laws approved August 13, 1947. Their first public appearance was in the 1947 Aquatennial Parade.

For 6 months they stabled their horses at the Rosolt Farms just west of Hwy 100 and Cty Road 62 (now the Crosstown). In 1948 the Zuhrah Shrine Horsemen purchased the Golden Valley Riding Academy September 29, 1948 for \$18k. It included a large barn, fenced riding area, bunkhouse, two houses and 13 acres. It was located in Plymouth, just east of Parkers Lake on south side of Cty Road 6 where Fernbrook intersects Cty Road 6.

It was expanded to 23 acres by the purchase of 10 acres for \$3500 from Earl Brown. Earle Brown donated \$1000 and Shriner's raised \$2500. By 1951 the barn/stable housed up to 40 horses and one of the houses was turned into a club house. The stalls and doors for the expansion of the barn were purchased from the Minneapolis Park Riding Academy located at 28th and DuPont.




Sunday Sept. 17, 1950 – Show-deo in Plymouth

The Zuhrah Shrine Horsemen started a horse show called “Show-deo” The first one was held in Hopkins at the County Fair Grounds in 1948 and the admission charge was \$1.00 for adults and \$.50 for children. The next two years in 1949 and 1950 the Show-deo was held in Plymouth at their farm. The next year it was back to Hopkins but they had rainy weather.

In 1952 and after it was held at the Minnesota State Fair Hippodrome. In 1955 they moved their operation to the Masonic Farm in Bloomington which provided them with a much larger stable and many more acres to ride. The Plymouth farm was then sold for housing development.

The Zuhrah Shrine Horsemen developed many of their intricate routines as the result of a member named Curt Carlson. During his many business travels he had opportunity to attend horse shows. As an example he took notes about the formations and home movies of such organizations as The Canadian Mounted Police and The Royal Dragoons of the US Calvary at Madison Square Gardens.

The first picture is a list of the horsemen. Note Curt Carlson and Earle Brown’s name on the list. The other picture is of Dinah, a horse that would face east and kneel. It was quite a dramatic piece of showmanship. The horse would enter the Hippodrome, kneel and the lights would dim way down as the “Horse Prayer” was read. In the dark the horse would exit and when the house lights came up everybody wondered what happened to the horse.

Ron Snook who grew right across from the Zhurah Horseman’s stable provided pictures and stories about helping out at the stables. He spent time with Foster Weatherly who managed the stable. He was called “Foss”, hired in 1951 and paid \$100 per month, \$30 food money and stayed in the bunkhouse along with another hired hand named Frank. Foss died in January 1953 and the Shriners hired Harry Hetelvedt in Jan 1953. Harry was also the Wagon Master and drove antique stagecoach with 4 horses. The Stage Coach was on loan from the Winnipeg Free Press and opened shows for years but is now back in Winnipeg at a museum.





Plymouth's Softball Team 1939

Genevieve (Ernst) Lane provided this great picture of Plymouth's Softball Team taken in 1939. She said the picture was taken on an open field on the east side of Parkers Lake. That field is now the neighborhood park. The uniforms were Blue and Gold gabardine fabric and the ball players are listed below. They played teams from around the area such as Dayton, Brooklyn Park, etc.

How do we know all this information? It was because Genevieve did a great job of documenting the information on the back of the picture. If all of us would document our life experiences like this, future generations wouldn't have to say - interesting picture but we don't have the foggiest idea who these ladies are or what they did.
