<u>Membership Renewal</u>

The Plymouth Historical Societies mission is the discovery, preservation and dissemination of historical knowledge about the City of Plymouth, Minnesota.

History Mystery

In an attempt to find out more about how Plymouth along with other Townships were named in Hennepin County; a trip to the MN State Historical Society was undertaken. They have in their collection the Hennepin County Board of Commissioners Journals (Minutes) starting in October 1857 along with large map registers and listings of all towns/townships along with name changes. The Hennepin County Commissioners were very busy in 1857 and 1858 leading up to Minnesota joining the Union as the 32nd State in May 11, 1858. The 157 year old Journals are wonderfully preserved and protected at the State Historical Society. They provide a very interesting glimpse into the past. As you read them you gravitate to trying to visualize what they were going through in organizing the government; county by county. The Hennepin County Commissioner Journals document the approval of the names of the Townships, establishing school districts, roads, etc and authorizing payment of all county bills for services.

The following are copies of excerpts from selected pages that add to the story about the naming of Plymouth and its name change to Medicine Lake for about 1½ years. The mystery only heightens because Plymouth Township records don't indicate a reason why it was changed back to Plymouth in 1860. It was always thought that the County Commissioners didn't approve of the name change but they did on Oct 15, 1858. At this point there is no reference in the county journals indicating the decision was reversed. One possible explanation is that maybe the vote in Plymouth didn't adhere to the process for a name change and the Office of Register of Deeds wouldn't issue final approval. If that was the case then it would null and void the County Commissioners approval. That is only a theory and buried in the many journal pages for 1859 – 60 is probably the answer and will require a more detailed examination.

It should be noted there are several interesting items. There was a township proposed to be established called Farmersville and later it was split and became part of Minneapolis and the Crystal Lake. It is also interesting to note that the Mississippi River was spelled by the clerk as Chipipippi River in several places in the journal. It begs the question was it a spelling error or maybe the river went by various early local names.

This portion of the alphabetical list of towns (townships) included Minneapolis, Minnetonka and Plymouth. There was no indication as to why or how certain towns (townships) names were chosen. It can be assumed there were many people lobbying for certain names, but only the names were listed of those approved.

In a "*History of Hennepin County*" (by George Warner and Charles Foote published in 1881) it was noted that Plymouth was named after a proposed town on the north side of Parkers Lake. The land speculator/developer that drew up a map and proposed the town probably had political influence to retain the name Plymouth but the town never materialized on Parkers Lake back in the 1860's.

Note in the description the location of Minneapolis west of the "Chipipippi" River.

A reader provided the following correction - The Winter 2014 newsletter states that the Clerk spelled Mississippi "Chipippipi." I believe that is incorrect. The letter that was interpreted as a capital "C" is actually a capital "M," with a decorative initial flourish that looks like a "C." (See image at p. 3 of the newsletter. That image shows "Minneapolis" with the same beginning letter.) The letters interpreted as the first "p" and the double "pp" are actually both "fs." The letter that looks like an "f" in "fs" is what is known as a long "s," which would now be written "s." Thus, "fs" would now be written "ss." (See <u>http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Long s</u>) The Clerk actually spelled Mississippi as "Mifsifsippi," using the long "s." If you look at the U.S. Constitution, you will see an example of the use of the long "s," with "Congress" being spelled "Congrefs."

A July 8th, 1858 meeting approved name and boundary changes for townships. German Home was changed to Minnetrista, and Marshall changed to Dayton

Oct 5, 1858 Mr. Huot from Plymouth reported that the people of Plymouth voted to change the name to Medicine Lake. He then was added to a committee working with the State Auditor.

Oct. 15, 1858 the Commissioners voted to change the name from Plymouth to Medicine Lake. Also note that Richland was changed to Richfield and Hamburg was changed to Medina. The name changes of Richfield and Medina continued but Medicine Lake reverted back to Plymouth by spring of 1860.

On April 5, 1859 the Annual Meeting was called to order in the name of Medicine Lake. The following year on April 3, 1860 the Annual Meeting was called to order in the name of Plymouth with no explanation of the change in the Town Clerk's book.

In late 1858 there was a list of personal and real estate value of towns in Hennepin Cty. Medicine Lake (Plymouth) had a total assessed valuation of \$63,078.10 of that \$47k was the value of all the real estate.
