

PHS CELEBRATES 45-YEAR ANNIVERSARY!



This fall, the Plymouth Historical Society celebrates forty-five years since its founding. The Society's Early Beginnings

The Plymouth Historical Society began as a preservation response. Early leaders were concerned over increasing development in the 1970s and felt a call to action to "preserve something of our past for future" generations." With a love of heritage and history, invitations were sent to community members to attend a chartering meeting, which took place on November 12, 1975 at the West Medicine Lake Community Club. Members' first concern was the preservation of Plymouth's first town hall building (now the Plymouth History Museum). The Society's meeting minutes of December 1, 1975 shows a motion was approved to write "a petition for use of the previous City Hall." By January 1976, the organization boasted a membership of 100 persons and it was made known that "the Mayor and Council back our use of the previous City Hall," allowing the group to take next steps toward the building's

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
physical preservation. This first year also saw the development of the Society's mission, with its purpose decided as an institution for "public information, education, development of speakers, accumulation and housing of artifacts, [and] development of a history of Plymouth" (PHS Minutes, 3 March 1976). Early members meetings were informal, consisting of "displays, entertainment and refreshments" and encouraged members to bring personal items of historical interest to share or even to "wear a costume from the 'olden days."

Town Hall Preservation and Museum Opening

One of the first actions taken by the Society was the preservation of Plymouth's first town hall. These works began in 1978 under the leadership of Mark Eckes and was funded through a combination of grant monies from the Minnesota Historical Society and donations from local business and individuals. In addition to preserving the original town hall, an addition was placed to the building's east and a new basement level was excavated to allow for greater display and meeting space. The Society began collecting artifacts from local community members, with an original interest in items dating to the 1880s and 1890s. After four years of preservation and collecting efforts, the museum opened for its first open house in April 1982. In the following years, the Society established a set of objectives to help reach their preservation aims, including holding regularly open houses and museum hours; inventorying historic sites within the town of Plymouth, led by board members Alice Mellen and Bea Jordan; recording a series of oral history interviews; and establishing regular lectures and presentations. Presentation themes included early Minnesota railroads, automobile history, Mission Farms, lessons in genealogy, historic landscaping, and music demonstrations.

Town Hall Centennial

In 1985, the PHS celebrated both its tenth anniversary as a society and the centennial of the "Old

Town Hall." The Society commemorated the event through special programs, a display in the thennew Plymouth city hall building, and designing a mug that features both the original and later civic buildings.

Carriage House Addition and New Traditions

Through the late 1980s and into the 1990s, the Society continued to expand and explore ways to preserve and present the history of Plymouth. December 1986 saw the first "Old Fashioned Christmas." This winter-themed event featured a decorative tree, bake sale, and storytelling, with later iterations featuring a visit with Santa, carol singers, sleigh rides, and reindeer. In 1988, due to the generosity of donors, the Society noted an increased need for storing its blossoming historical artifact collection. This led to the construction of a second building near the history museum for the purposes of additional storage and display area, known lovingly as the "Carriage House." In 1991, the Society held its first "History Fest," another annual tradition that ran through the 2000s that included historical presen-

tations, including the legendary Schiebe automobile collection. Annual flower sales, led by Ben Broman, brought colorful fundraising opportunities to the museum. 2008 saw the first of the "History on Parade" bus tours, led by Gary Schiebe. Attendees would enjoy a two-hours' ride on a classic bus while learning about historic sites throughout Plymouth. Sites explored through the tour included historic farms and homesteads, places of worship, places affiliated with the Luce Line railroad, and other sites related to nineteenth and early-twentieth century Plymouth history. In 2010 and 2011, the Society hosted historical fashion shows, demonstrating examples of different kinds of dress within the museum's collections.

City Partnership and PHS Today

In 2017, the Society and the City of Plymouth entered an agreement through which the City would provide a staff person to assist the Society with its ongoing preservation and programmatic efforts. This partnership has led to new opportunities for exploring how Plymouth's past can be preserved for the future. Volunteers continue to be a cornerstone, and they contribute through numerous ways, including serving as board members, assisting with collections sorting and inventorying, helping with communications, participating in events such as our recent cemetery tour and (now virtual) open houses, and assisting in our Finding Place in Plymouth oral history project. We are thankful for the past forty-five years of dedication to make the Society what it is today, and we look forward to how we can continue to discover, preserve, and share the history of Plymouth!


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VIRTUAL OPEN HOUSE SERIES
